ommunities all over the United States are feeling the impact of the mental health and counseling provider shortage. In 2021, over one third of the population lived in an area that lacked an adequate number of mental health professionals, and it's not uncommon for individuals to seek a therapist, only to be turned away or put onto a month's long waiting list.

The pandemic magnified this issue. Millions struggled with

forced isolation, and issues of depression and anxiety that had reasonably been kept at bay through outside activities and distractions now reached a crisis point. West Bergen saw this escalation first hand, with calls to our Access Center increasing exponentially, yet the supply of licensed professionals available has simply not kept up with the demand for services. Why? While there are a number of factors driving this

shortage, the mental health and counseling internship crisis is among the most significant. To become a licensed professional, students are required to enter into an internship program during their graduate educations. The sad reality is that there are significantly more internship seekers than there are internships. And this is the case for all mental health professions - social work, marriage and family therapy, professional counseling, addictions counseling and more. Not finding an internship opportunity can stall and some-

times derail a student's trajectory. And, of course, this only exacerbates the mental health crisis.

Enter The West Bergen Clinical Training & Education Institute, the Agency's newly launched training and education center. The goal of this initiative is to enhance our current internship program by increasing internship placements and developing a more comprehensive training environment for the next generation of mental health professionperts acting as the Institute's Advisory Board, the program provides future therapists and community partners with cutting edge supervision and training. Phase One is a year-long program, and will be comprised

als. Under the leadership of a group of highly qualified ex-

of a group of carefully selected undergraduate and graduate students who will be invited to join the Institute in conjunction with their accredited higher education settings. Students will be overseen by mental health professionals who will provide ongoing consultation, and each student will be assigned a clinical expert to relate to on an ongoing basis.

West Bergen CEO Michael Tozzoli believes that the Institute will help not only West Bergen serve its clients, but will also benefit the community at large. "No one should have to wait weeks or months to finally see a therapist – and making sure that students who need qualified internship opportunities have access to them is one step in the right direction toward overcoming the mental health provider shortage."

A secondary and equally important mission of the Institute is to enhance and expand the current free community mental health education programs that West Bergen extends to local partners and organizations. In this way, not only will the Institute prepare tomorrow's clinicians to become effective and caring mental health practitioners, but it will also support the parent agency in its quest to lower mental health stigma through education and awareness.
